When you fill in your class requests please make sure the numbers of your classes are legible and that you have listed 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} choices in case your 1^{st} choice class is full. You must enter at least three choices for each day you plan on weaving. Not listing three choices may affect your registration.

Registration is on a first come first served basis for the first 120 registrants and MAY 1, 2021 is the registration deadline. With your registration, send in separate checks for each of your 1st choice classes made out to the teacher of that class. You must write separate checks for each class. These checks, made out to the teacher of each class, should be dated for August 19, 2021.

Pay special attention to the **DEADLINE: May 1, 2021. Absolutely NO refunds will be given after this date.** (Special circumstances may be reviewed by the committee.) **If you cancel after the May 1**st deadline, you will need to contact your teachers to make arrangements for someone to pick up your kits or you can pay postage to have the teachers mail

them to you. The committee will not be responsible for mailing your kits to you.

All reservations must be guaranteed with a major credit card. Reservations cancelled after 48 hours prior to the day of arrival may be charged one night's room fee and tax.

Campground and RV sites are available within 1.5 miles from the Lodge. Reservations for camp/RV sites must be made through Reserve America at www.kentuckystateparks.reserveamerica.com All other room and cottage reservations must be made by calling Lure Lodge at 270-343-3111

ALL accommodations are NON-SMOKING. There will be a strict enforcement of this. There will be a \$100.00 fine added to the room/cottage charge of any accommodation in which smoking has occurred. The fine covers the cleaning costs required to return the accommodation to a smoke free

Intermediate: for those who have some experience in start/stop, over/under weaving, twining and setting up a base and doing a basic rim.

Advanced: for those who have mastered the basic skills and are ready to try new techniques and/or other creative methods.


